# What is the worship that is pleasing to God?

Of utmost importance is to understand what is meant by the word "worship." The primary word translated "worship" in the New the Greek Testament is word proskuneo. Literally, it means "to kiss toward." Practically, it means "to give reverence to, pay homage, make prostrate obeisance. oneself." all worship Therefore, requires making God the focal point of all actions and one's intentions. Worship is not designed to entertain the congregation, neither is it designed appeal "the to to unchurched." It is designed to honour and glorify God.

John 4:24 is a key verse in this study: "God is spirit, and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in truth." Let's look at this verse more closely and identify its component parts.

"**God**" is the *audience* of worship. Too many people think those sitting in the pews are the audience. When real worship is being done, every church member should seek to honour and glorify God by their worship. "They that worship him" is the actors of worship. I use the word "actors" not in the movie sense of someone playing a role different from who they are, but because worship requires action. Therefore, those who provide the actions of worship are the actors. Again, every member present is worshipping God, not seeking to be entertained by others. Too much of what is called worship today is nothing more than wholesome entertainment designed appeal people. to While to wholesome entertainment is good, it is not worship.

"**Must worship him**" is the *absolute* of worship. The word "must" show an absolute. That is, there is no room for change, bargaining, or such like. When I tell my children "you must" that settles the matter. When God uses the word "must" in respect to worship, then whatever God says is to be followed without addition, subtraction, or alteration of any kind. "**In spirit**" is the *attitude* of worship. The spirit here refers to the inner his/her thoughts. person \_ intentions, emotions, and desires. Worship must be heart-felt, else it is empty and vain. We should desire to worship God because of all He has done for us. David said, "I was glad when they said to me, 'let us go into the house of the Lord'" (Psalm 122:1). Psalm 100 indicates the state of mind we should have when entering into worship: "Make a joyful noise unto the LORD, all ye lands. Serve the LORD with gladness: come before his presence with singing. Know ye that the LORD he is God: it is he that hath made us. and not we ourselves; we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture. Enter into his gates with thanksgiving, and into his courts with praise: be thankful unto him. and bless his name. For the LORD is good; his mercy is everlasting; and his truth endures to all generations."

"In truth" is the *action* of worship. As we noted earlier, worship must be heartfelt, else it is in vain. However, sincerity and gladness of heart are not sufficient in and of themselves to validate worship. There must also be the proper action. God's word is truth (John 17:17). Thus, to worship in truth is to worship according to the word of God. All things are to be done in the name of (i.e., by the authority of) Jesus Christ (Colossians 3:17).

Jesus once condemned the worship of the Jews on two counts, saying, "This people honour me with their lips, but their heart is far from me. They worship me in vain, teaching as doctrines human commands" (Mt 15:8-9). The two condemnations are (1) the failure to engage their hearts in worship and (2) worshipping according to the doctrine of man and not according to the word of God.

Note that "in spirit" is joined to "in truth" by a coordinating conjunction (John 4:24). Therefore, both aspects are subject to the absolute of worship. Worship "in spirit" (right attitude) but not "in truth" (right action) is vain. Likewise, worship in truth (right action) without the proper spirit (attitude) is also in vain. The absence of either one negates the entire effort.

There are five acts of worship found in the church of the New Testament. They are:

1) observing the Lord's Supper every first day of the week (Acts 20:7, 1 Corinthians 11:18-34);

- giving as prospered each first day of the week (1 Corinthians 16:1-2, 2 Corinthians 9:6-7);
- 3) prayer to God the Father (Acts 2:42, 12:5);
- 4) preaching of the Word (Acts 20:7-12);
- 5) singing (Ephesians 5:19, Colossians 3:16, 1 Corinthians 14:15).

# Declaration of Principles

The Declaration of Principles affirmed by Christ Church in its Trust Deed. It explains our historic standard and why Christ Church was founded in 1896. Christ Church remains true to the declaration while also embracing the liberty of worship that is contemporary, Spirit-filled, and God-honouring.

Christ Church [...], which is a branch of the Holy Catholic Church of the Lord Jesus Christ, united by faith to Him, who is the Head over all things to the Church which is His Body, and recognising the essential unity of all who, by a like faith, are united to the one Divine and Common Head, makes declaration of its Principles as follows:

The [...] Church, holding "the faith once delivered to the saints," declares its belief in the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments as the Word of God, and the sole Rule of Faith and Practice; in the Creed commonly called "The Apostles' Creed"; in the Divine Institution of the Sacraments of Baptism and the Lord's Supper; and in the Doctrines of Grace substantially as they are set forth in the Thirty-nine Articles of Religion.

This church recognises and adheres to Episcopacy, not as of Divine right, but as a very ancient and desirable form of Church polity.

This Church, retaining a liturgy which shall not be repressive of freedom in prayer, accepts the Book of Common Prayer, as it was received, prepared, and recommended for use by the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church, A.D. 1785, reserving full liberty to alter, abridge, enlarge, and amend the same, as may seem most conducive to the edification of the people, "provided that the substance of the faith be kept entire".

This Church CONDEMNS and REJECTS the following erroneous and strange doctrines as contrary to God's word:

First – that the Church of Christ exists only in one order or form of ecclesiastical polity;

Second – that Christian ministers are 'priests' in another sense than that in which all believers are a 'royal priesthood'';

Third – that the Lord's Table is an altar on which the oblation of the body and blood of Christ is offered anew to the Father;

Fourth – that the presence of Christ in the Lord's Supper is a presence in the elements of Bread and Wine;

Fifth - that regeneration is inseparably connected with Baptism.

In accordance with the liberty given in Article 3 of the above Declaration of Principles, this Church accepts the Book of Common Prayer of the Church of England, with such revisions as shall exclude sacerdotal doctrines and practices.

This Church, as a Reformed and Protestant Church, hereby reaffirms its constant witness against all those innovations in doctrines and worship, whereby the primitive faith has been from time to time defaced or overlaid, and which at the Reformation were disowned and rejected.

This Church will maintain communion with all Christian Churches and will set forward, so far it lies within its ability, quietness, peace, and love, among all Christian people.

All evangelical Christians should have no problem accepting such a declaration, which represents classical evangelical beliefs and practises within our Reformed Episcopal heritage. To God be the Glory!!!

### Is the Devil Omniscient?

The devil is not, nor can he be, omniscient (know all things). If he were omniscient. he would be God. passage pertinent to this A discussion is 1 Corinthians 2:6-8. which says, "Howbeit we speak wisdom among them that are perfect: yet not the wisdom of this world, nor of the princes of this world, that come to nought: but we speak the wisdom of God in a mystery, even the hidden wisdom, which God ordained before the world unto our glory: which none of the princes of this world knew: for had they known it, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory."

There can be no doubt the devil was the driving force behind those who hated Christ and had Him killed. Paul's statement here notes that if the truth had been known, Jesus would not have been killed. Think about this for a moment the only way all men could be saved would be for Jesus to die in their place. If the devil had known this, he would have done everything in his power to stop it! Also consider Hebrews 2:14–15: "Forasmuch then as the children are partakers of flesh and blood, he also himself likewise took part of the same; that through death he might destroy him that had the power of death, that is, the devil; and deliver them who through fear of death were all their lifetime subject to bondage."

Jesus, through His death and resurrection, destroyed the power of the devil. If the devil were omniscient, he would have known this ahead of time and never allowed Jesus to be crucified.

In like fashion, if the devil were omniscient, he would know exactly how to tempt us at all times in order to get us away from God. I believe the devil only uses what has worked in the past, and when we learn to conquer that particular temptation, he tries something else.
